


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Greetings

We are pleased to report that Literal Change made significant progress in advancing our mission of promoting literacy and education over the past year. This success would not have been possible without the dedication and hard work of our team, including our incredible volunteers, as well as the support of our donors. One of the highlights of the past year has been the expansion of our outreach to schools and teachers, which has helped more students develop the reading skills they need to succeed in school and beyond. 

Start a bookclub at the TSDC in collaboration with the Toronto Public Library.


Responding to the Right-to-Read

In February of this year, the Ontario Human Rights Commission released the Right-to-Read report, declaring that Ontario schools are failing students with Learning Disabilities and recommended an evidencebased methodology to reading and writing instruction.

The OHRC echoed our concerns as a literacy charity involved with schools across Ontario and reaffirmed the instruction methodology we have been using since 2016. We are motivated to have this information more publicly available and we are helping parents and teachers unpack the information in the report through efforts like our Light into Literacy campaign.

The report also strongly emphasizes teacher trainina. findina that "teachers are not given sufficient education and support" and that they "learn very little about how skilled reading develops and how to teach word reading using proven approaches/structured literacy in their pre-service and in-service education professional and development.

This is an issue that our team, which consists of trained educators and parents, has been aware of and worked to present a solution for through the creation of the Literacy Specialist e-Course.



Responding to the Right-to-Read

The report also emphasized the importance of early evidence-based assessments. In response to this and to calls from teachers asking for more accessible assessments, we created a modified assessment for teachers to use in their classrooms. Our team is also focusing on increasing our outreach to Special Education teachers in Primary Schools, who work with students at the most crucial age of reading and writing acquisition.

We understand that the recommendations of the report are not binding on schools and will continue to advocate for equal access to literacy education alongside students, parents, and teachers.

We are determined to bridge the gap in literacy education and provide support to the students who need it the most. We are determined to empower students, teachers and parents with the tools, knowledge and resources to ensure all students have the opportunity to reach their full potential.

Student Spotlight

In conversation with a Literal Change student*:

Tell the story of how you started with Literal Change?

"The way I found literal change is a very personal one. Throughout my life, I have been passed around by councillors, psychiatrists and therapists. About 2 years ago I found a therapist who stuck with me to help me with my day-to-day issues, and eventually, helped me with my learning disability diagnosis. After leaving high school without graduating, I had to take an English course to qualify for my diploma. Learning from my extreme difficulties with school and specifically English classes. mv recommended l iteral therapist Change to help me graduate."

Before you started with Literal Change, how did you feel about reading and writing?

Reading and writing could have been a fantastic outlet for me, considering I'm naturally a creative person, but going through school and having the background that I have made that impossible for me. First of all, I'm a first-generation immigrant who grew up learning 3 languages at home. That would have been fine if not for my learning disability, which left me with halfbaked versions of all 3 languages. Through school, having a disability taught me that even if I tried my hardest to keep up with classmates, I could never be at their level, which is verv disheartening. Stress over school has made me hate reading and writing and even made me anxious to do anything related to it.

Student Spotlight

In conversation with a Literal Change student:

How do you feel about reading and writing now?

Although school still makes me anxious, having someone help and me through lessons quide is extremely relieving. Completing assignments can be fun and I don't have to be scared of deadlines because my tutor helps me pace myself and keep me on track. I also picked up reading books because of the lack of pressure from school. I've started to pick up creative writing too to test out the things I've been learning in my course.

What is your favourite thing about working with your tutor?

I really enjoy being able to do assignments with my tutor, and receiving feedback when I need it. It's practically impossible for me to do anything academic by myself, so I'm really happy I have a day a week where my tutor can help me work on the things I need to do.

Would you recommend Literal Change to someone who is struggling with reading and writing?

I absolutely would recommend Literal Change to anyone I know struggling with reading and writing. I've made loads of progress with the program, and I no longer feel like I'm alone in my journey with my learning.


